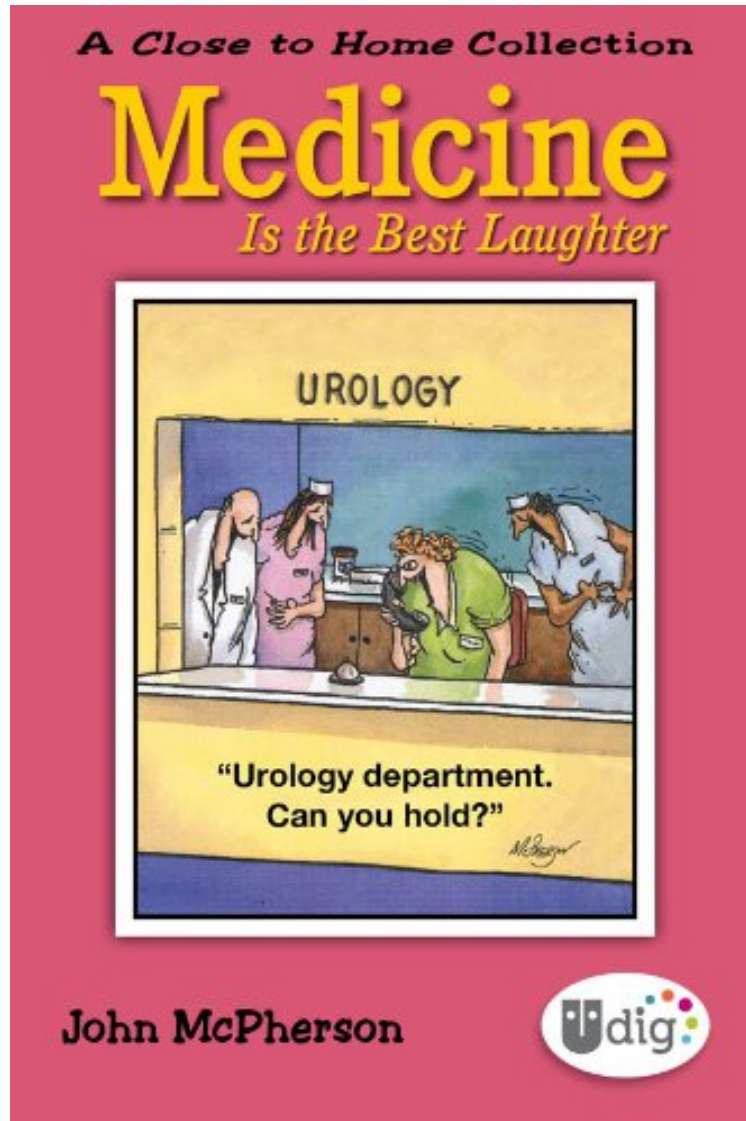


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Close to Home: Medicine Is the Best Laughter: A Close to Home Collection
