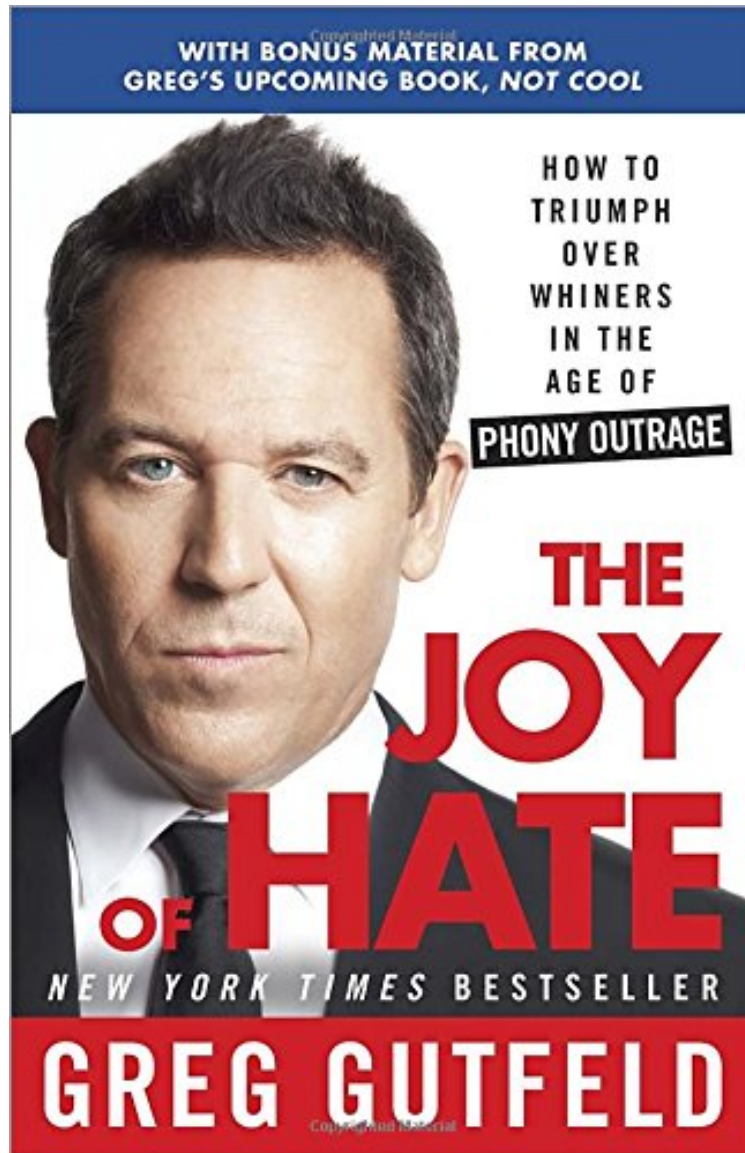

If you like easy to read and irreverent political commentary, you should enjoy this book as much as I did. The chapters are short -- so they can be read in bite-sized increments -- and each is like an extended version of one of the entries on Gutfeld's blog "The Daily Gut." And for those of us who miss what "The Daily Gut" used to be -- lately it's just been a vehicle to announce the guests for the "Red Eye" television show -- it's nice to see that Gutfeld has not lost any of the zip on his pundit's fast ball. All the usual suspects are addressed in the book -- political correctness, feminazism, the Occupy Movement, etc. -- and all are skewered as only Gutfeld can do. Most of the arguments and observations presented are not new, but Gutfeld's irreverent, and delightfully disjointed, presentation of those arguments is both enjoyable and amusing. His humor is not for everyone -- much like Monty Python is not for everyone -- but it's the kind of thing I genuinely enjoy. I certainly would recommend the book to other conservatives, to libertarians, to those who eschew political labels but enjoy good political humor, and to liberals (excuse me, Progressives) who are open-minded enough to be able and willing to laugh at themselves from time to time (if there are any).

And no problem if you're a bigot, as long as you're politically correct about it. - The demonizing of the Tea Party and romanticizing of the Occupy Wall Streeters. - The media who are always offended (see MSNBC lineup)- How critics of Obamacare or illegal immigration are somehow immediately labeled racists. - The endless debate over the Ground Zero Mosque (which Gutfeld planned to open a Muslim gay bar next to). - As well as pretentious music criticism, slow-moving ceiling fans, and snotty restaurant hostesses. Funny and sarcastic to the point of being mean (but in a nice way), The Joy of Hate points out the true jerks in this society and tells them all off.
